Monthly Bird Walks at Quarry Hill

# April 9 - Whitewater Valley Field trip

Meet in the east parking lot of the Heintz Center to car pool. Bring your own lunch. We'll visit the Whitewater State Park Nature Center and look for early spring migrants throughout the management area, especially waterfowl in the many pools. We'll return by mid-afternoon.

## April 13 - Woodcock Watch Field Trip

Every spring Woodcock perform one of the strangest and most interesting mating rituals. We will observe it up close, beginning at dusk. Meet near the entrance at Chester Woods County Park at 7:30 PM or in the horse corral parking lot. Note: a County Parks sticker is required to enter the park.

## April 22 - Reservoir Field Trip

Meet in the east parking lot at the Heintz Center to car pool. The flood control reservoirs around Rochester have created some of the best bird habitat in Olmsted County and are more often than not where local rarities are found. We will visit several to see what we can turn up during migration. There will only be a few short walks totaling less than a mile. Bring a scope and binoculars if you have them, otherwise some will be available to share.

## **White-crowned Sparrows**

Each spring I look forward to seeing a few White-crowned Sparrows under my feeder and in the brushier parts of my yard. Their distinctive black-and-white head, pale beak, and crisp gray breast make them one of the easiest sparrows to identify.

White-crowned Sparrows will eat sunflower and other kinds of seeds – though they prefer to stay on the ground eating seeds dropped by other birds.

In southeast Minnesota we generally only see these birds during spring and fall migration – so keep a close watch for these sparrows in your garden this spring.

The information they gather helps identify migration staging areas and wintering areas, and much more.

# Make this year's garden bird and bee friendly

Encouraging butterflies, bees and other insects to visit your yard is easy!

- 1. Let your lawn go a little let some clover and dandelions grow for the bees and butterflies.
- 2. Go native our birds and insects much prefer native plants. Modern hybrids may look good but often contain less pollen and nectar.
- 3. No pesticides your intent may be to just kill some ants – but the chemicals kill everything – including all the "good bugs".
- 4. Plant some milkweed Monarch populations have declined 90% in just a few years. Milkweed comes in several beautiful varieties and is easy to grow.
- 5. Add water a birdbath is a great start. Add some shallow dishes filled with wet sand or small pebbles and water and the bees and butterflies will thank you.
