Nov 25th - International Owl Center



Karla Bloem, a.k.a. "The Owl Lady," is the Executive Director of the International Owl Center in Houston, MN. She lives and

works with Alice, a permanently disabled Great Horned Owl who forever changed her life when she came to live with Karla.

The close relationship between Karla and Alice has led to an in-depth vocal study on Great Horned Owls, an annual International Festival of Owls, and the development of an International Owl Center in Houston, MN.

Karla's owl adventures have taken her to testify before the Minnesota House and Senate environment committees to gain protection for Great Horned Owls, to the Netherlands, Germany, Argentina, and Italy to present her research, and won her a Bush Leadership Fellowship. She has also assisted the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, author Stan Tekiela and British filmmaker Fergus Beeley with various owl projects.

Karla will bring along one or more of her feathered co-workers to talk about the International Owl Center and how they plan to fulfill their mission of making the world a better place for owls through education and research.

Christmas Bird Count!

Join us Saturday December 20 for the annual Rochester Christmas Bird Count. Zumbro Valley Audubon members work in teams to scout Rochester and the surrounding area for early winter birds. You do not need to be a bird expert. Actually, it's a great way to learn about new birds. Counting is done from the warmth of cars or on short hikes.

We typically find over 50 species and frequently turn up an unusual bird or two! We need and appreciate feeder reports as well as field participants. Our numbers are reported to National Audubon and added to a CBC database that has been collected annually for over 100 years!

We will meet 7:15 a.m. at the west Silver Lake parking lot, near the fire station. Lunch and a mid-day tally will be held at Quarry Hill Nature Center from noon to 1 p.m. Bring your own lunch. A light meal and final tally will be held at Quarry Hill Nature Center at 4:45 p.m. Hot soup is provided; bring something to share.

To submit a feeder report, download a report form from the ZVAS web site, www.zumbroval-leyaudubon.org, or call Clifford Hansen at 281-0249 to have a paper form mailed to you. Thank you for your participation!

For even more bird counting fun, Whitewater State Park will hold its annual CBC on Jan 1st from 8 AM to noon. They moved their count circle south this year to include the city of St. Charles and Carley State Park. Feeder reports are also needed. For more information call Whitewater park at 507-932-3007.

Now they find bare cropland over most of the area. Brushy, weedy, seed-filled areas are few and far between. Hundreds of years ago, but just a blink in the grand scheme of things, they found wild land over 20 to 100 times as many acres. Even if their breeding territory is intact (which it is not), their wintering area cannot support any where near the populations that must have been here historically.

I wonder if Juncos tell tales of yesteryear – the good old days.

When a House is not a Home

We humans often consider our house to be the same as our home. But that is not at all true for birds. While a few birds do use enclosed structures for a part of their life, even those generally move to another 'home' at least annually. The vast majority of birds spend only a tiny part of each year at a temporary nest. And all birds spend nearly all their waking hours out and about, mostly finding food, but also socializing, hiding from predators and moving to new places.

To make it through a year, birds need a lot more than a place to sleep. With few exceptions, they have no refrigerator or pantry from which to get their next meal. They must go out into potentially dangerous areas to find, catch and consume what food they need. Birds must depend on their instincts and training to know what to eat, and how to eat it, with no food labels, no cookbooks, and no 'best by' dates!

Birds have no toilets or washing facilities in their houses. They have to find places 'in the neighborhood'. And while there, they cannot rely on police or custom to keep them safe. They have to be on the lookout for other creatures that consider them edible.

When it gets bitterly cold, we stay indoors, put on more clothes or blankets, and rely on fossil fuel for heat. What can birds do when the polar vortex brings the arctic to MN?

So, does the neighborhood you and your fellow humans provide a decent home for birds? You may provide food in winter, but how about baby bird food (insects)? Do you provide water and shelter of various kinds for the wide range of birds?



If we want to be good neighbors to birds, we should consider *all* of the many needs of their lives.
